
Straight Talk

Last Saturday night Emmett Sams, our very reliable reporter of things athletic at Mars Hill College. called to report results of the Mountain Lion tussle with Hiawassee. Things went along fine until Emmett said "Brevard Brown, 36 points."...We asked him to please repeat and talk slower, and when the answer still came out the same we asked for further information on this phenomenon of the hardwood.

We knew that Brevard has a few things in common with another hardwood artist — one Coy Carson—because both hail from Asheville.... And after getting a look at his record for the past two seasons, we are immediately recommending him to one Tom Scott as a teammate for Carson before Murray Greason or Everett Case learn his address.... You know, he does still have three years of varsity eligibility remaining after finishing up Junior College this season.

Brevard probably wouldn't get a second look from Adolph Rupp, who says if a guy don't duck coming in at a six foot six inch door he doesn't

even bother to shake hands.... He stands well under six feet in height, but his record speaks for itself.

Last year Brevard sizzled the hoop for a total of 323 points in 21 games, but has already beaten his own record with 328 points in only 18 games so far this season...And there are still two games to go.... This stacks up as a total of 651 points for 39 games, or an average of 16.7 points per game.

Last Saturday night, Brevard topped off his two-year performance by setting a new court record at Mars Hill Junior College when he bucketed 36 points against Hiawassee in a conference game.

But as a further warning to Scott, Greason and Case, basketball is just one of Brevard's ideas for amusement.

He is the regular shortstop on Coach Red Ramsey's Mountain Lions baseball team and is considered something more than a warm number on double plays... He batted in leadoff position for the Lions last season and ended up with a .353 swat average in junior college competition.

Last spring Coach Edwards was in need of a man who could broad jump to round out his team of thinly clads-and Brevard came through.... He jumped 21 feet, 7 inches to capture several first places in track competition. . . At least once he did a double act that still has the boys talking ... He was all hooked up in a baseball game and nearby the Lions were engaged in a track meet. .. So, while his team was at bat, Brevard hopped over to the jumping pit, jumped his usual 21 feet and then went back to take his cut at the baseball.

Another note which might be of interest to the university boys is the fact that Brevard is also no slouch as a student.... He has a very high scholastic average, having made the Dean's list each of the three semesters he has been enrolled at Mars Hill Junior College.... Incidentally, making the Dean's list only requires a 40 quality point rating or "A" average.

In the nightcap, Brevard Brown's 21 points were a big feature in the Mars Hill 58-53 triumph over the Asheville-Biltmore College quintet. Brown's exceptional ability to score when the chips were down proved the Bulldogs' downfall. That, and the fact that the Bulldogs were decidedly off form, gave Asheville-Biltmore its second junior conference loss of the season.

The Bulldogs started the game off at a terrific pace as they showered the basket with shots but couldn't hit for scores. Johnny Israel and Captain Jack Brinkley gave them a 9-8 lead at the end of the first period.

Mars Hill rallied in the second. Johnny Shaver, Brevard Brown, Bill High, and Bobby Steele came up with a bunch of pretty plays all climaxed by scores to send the Mountain Lions out front at the half, 26 to 18.

Coach Floyd Woody's pep talk between halves must have given the Bulldogs new life as they answered the bell for the third quarter. Brinkley, Kenneth Rudeen, and Dub Thompson spearheaded the rally which closed the gap at the end of the period to a 39-34 count with Mars Hill still in the lead.

The fourth quarter was a thriller. Larry Carter, who played a fine defensive game all evening long, initiated the Bulldogs' scoring. Brinkley hit twice for scores. Rudeen hit once, and with about four minutes gone in the period, Israel tied the score at 40-40. From that point on, until the end of the game it was nip-and-tuck as each team fought for the lead.

With about a minute to play, Brown turned on the heat, slicing in three quick field goals and a pair of free throws to send the Lions out front, 58-53, and that's the way it ended.
