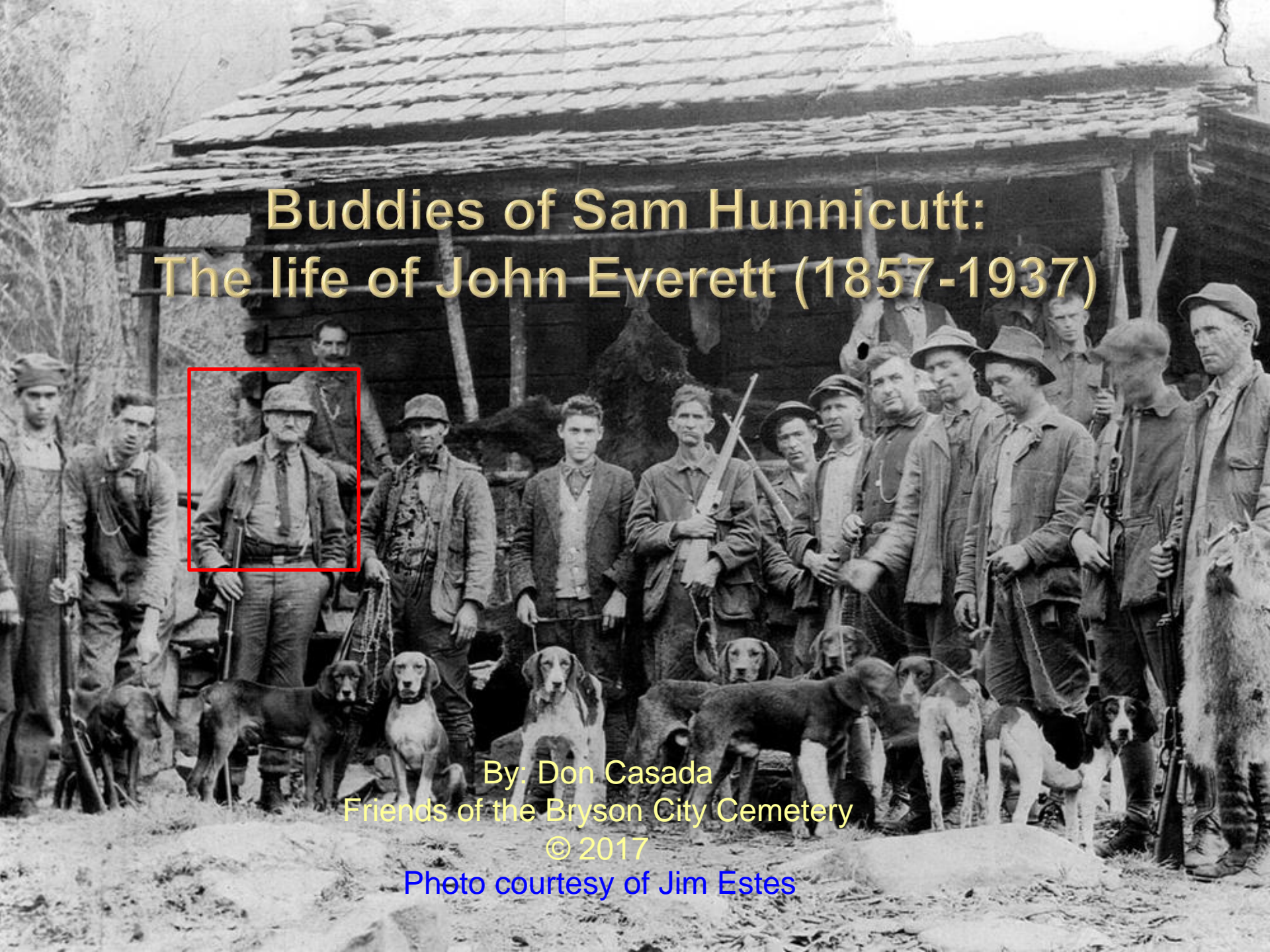

John Everett

- ▣ Born in Blount County, Tennessee in 1857 (his obituary erroneously says he was a native of Bryson City)
- ▣ Son of Epp Everett, 1st county sheriff and 1st town mayor; Epp had served the 3rd TN Mounted Infantry and also the Thomas Legion
- ▣ Married Anna Lou Simpson, twin sister of Fannie Simpson Leatherwood
- ▣ Father of six daughters by Anna Lou, including Fannie Everett Clancy

He was known to the law as a young man

- ▣ 1876 spring term, Swain Superior Court: Assault and Battery – true bill, payment of costs
- ▣ 1884, spring term – Assault and Battery, pleads guilty, judgment suspended until next term, \$200 security
- ▣ Also 1884, spring term – Carrying Concealed Weapon, pleads guilty, judgment suspended until next term, \$200 security

But he later served as Deputy Sheriff

— Asheville *Citizen*: Deputy Sheriff J. H. Everett of Bryson City, was in Asheville last night, on his way home from the Indian Territory, where he had gone to take the Indian, John Muskrat, who had been implicated in two murders, had escaped two years ago, and had taken refuge with the Indians of this State. Mr. Everett went to Tablequah, the capital of the Cherokees, delivered his prisoner to Chief C. H. Harris and received the reward, \$500.

Everett had previously taught school

- ▣ Taught in the original courthouse in the 1870s
- ▣ Previously taught subscription schools on Jenkins and Bryson Branches

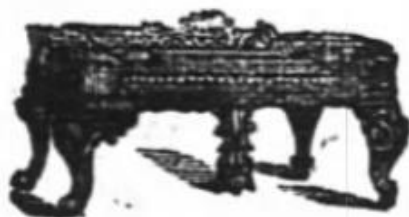

John Everett, undercover G-man

- ▣ Went to New Jersey and New York in 1892 as an undercover agent for the Federal Government to catch “green good swindlers” (counterfeiters)
- ▣ He helped in the arrest of a gang in Gloucester City, NJ
- ▣ In New York, an attempt to arrest the gang resulted in the NY police restraining him, allowing the gang to escape
- ▣ His integrity was vouched for by a U.S. Commissioner in Camden, NJ and a U.S. Postmaster

The Everett family was devastated around the turn of the 20th century

GO TO SWAIN COUNTY FOR A WEEK'S HUNTING

R. O. Patterson and J. H. Everett Will Chase Deer, Bear, etc., With Famous Pack of Hounds.

Lieutenant R. O. Patterson leaves this afternoon with J. H. Everett for Bryson City for a week's hunting near that place. They will take with them the famous pack of hounds which they own jointly. There are eight of the dogs and they are generally supposed to be the best trained fox, deer and bear dogs in this part of the state. They have received some flattering offers for some of them.

The country over which they will hunt is well known for the abundance of large game to be found. The fox races will be run near Bryson City during the first part of the week. They will then go to the head of Deep creek for a deer hunt, and from there they will go through the mountains to the head of Ocona Lufty river, near the Tennessee line, where they expect to find plenty of deer and bear. Every fall and winter there are many bears killed in those mountains, sportsmen coming from all parts of the country for the purpose.

Both Mr. Everett and Lieutenant Patterson are experienced hunters and are well acquainted with the country in which they will hunt, and they express confidence in a successful week's sport. They will arrive in Bryson City tonight and will be joined by other hunters at that place.

Everett, Sam Honeycutt, George Flowers, Columbus Honeycutt, Mark Cathey, Waitsell Honeycutt, Hill Cathey and Joe Parish. They were out four days with ten dogs and killed the bear after a two days' chase on the right hand prong of Deep Creek. John Parrish was the fortunate one to do the shooting. They all report a glorious good time.

Claims Champ Fiddler Honors In North State

Fiddlers, stand forth. You are hereby challenger to look well to your laurels. Scrapers of the resined bow, one claiming a right to the Old North State championship crown, makes himself known.

J. H. Everett, of Asheville, stirred by a press announcement in which another is coted as "the champion of the state," has issued his challenge to all fiddlers in North Carolina to contest with him to determine who can play more old time tunes alternating with a mixture of classic selections.

Mr. Everett, producing a statement prepared by an official of the Indian reservation at Chero-

kee, points to the fact that this certifies his position as champion, since he took first place in the September, 1921, fiddlers' contest at the reservation, during the time of the Indian fair, and that time he then bested E. H. Helton, of Asheville, who took second place, and J. D. Harris.

Both of the last mentioned took part in the contest held last Saturday night at Hazlewood, Mr. Helton taking first place in the meet. Mr. Everett was not present that night.

With regard to Helton's victory the press received a report stating that "J. D. Harris has been a number of years, champion fiddler of North Carolina, and his defeat for first honors Saturday night makes E. H. Helton 'the champion of the state,' is claimed."

Mr. Everett wants an opportunity to contest with any claiming the honors which he, himself, asserts.

O. H. Helton Claims State Championship Honors.

When O. H. Helton, of Asheville, defeated J. H. Everett, also of the City, in a fiddlers contest at Hazelwood Saturday night, the winner was awarded \$20 in gold as a prize. Helton now claims to be champion wielder of the resin bow in North Carolina. He played the following selections: "Turn Me Loose," "Cackling Hen," "Turnpike," "Sweet Bunch of Daisies," "Green River," "Nancy Rollin," "Asheville," "The Preacher and the Bear," "Cumberland Gap," "Beggar Man," "Virginia Reel," "Over the Waves," "Whistling Rufus," and "Georgia Camp Meeting."

By 1930, he was in Tennessee

- ▣ 1930 census records him living on Banks Avenue in Knoxville, living in a home valued at \$3150
- ▣ Married to a woman named Martha Jane McCullough who was 14 years younger than him
- ▣ Profession, per census, was Piano Tuner

He returned to Bryson City in 1934 for a special Oconee Lodge celebration
