Patriarch:

Marmaduke Hudson Mendenhall (1823-1887)

We know very little about him pre-1880.

- Born 13 February 1823 in Deep River, Guilford County, NC
- Recorded in census records from 1850-1870 as a farmer in Guilford County; his children were also recorded as working on the farm.
- In 1861, was named as a member of a Vigilance Committee (a unionist, anti-Confederacy group) for Southwest Guilford County.

First Marriage (1848):

Phebe Spurgeon (1822 – 1871), buried in Deep River, NC

Children:

- Montalva Demosthene Mendenhall (1852-1883)
- William Carey Mendenhall (1858 1937)

Second Marriage (1872):

Rebecca Jellico Eaton (1838-1915), buried Green Hills Cemetery, Waynesville NC

No children

The Mendenhalls were Quakers

Attended the Deep River Friends Meeting House in High Point



Basic Quaker beliefs/practices

- Do not consider the Bible to be the final authority or the only source of sacred wisdom.
- Leadership is primarily invested in the laity
- Silent worship
- Do not perform baptisms nor communion
- Pacifists and abolitionists

The Mendenhalls in Haywood County

- Marmaduke Mendenhall married 2nd wife Rebecca in 1872; her son was a businessman in Waynesville
- In 1880, he is in Haywood County and is recorded in the census as a wagoner; son Carey is also in the business. They are wealthy enough to have 2 servants.
- W. H. Mendenhall became a partner in a merchant business with stores in Waynesville and Charleston (now Bryson City) until the end of 1880
- In 1880 the corporation was dissolved by mutual agreement, In 1881, Mendenhall purchased his first property in the town of Charleston

Life in Swain County


- First purchase in Swain County was recorded in 1881 for a lot in town of Charleston
- According to an article in the Asheville Citizen-Times in 1953, the
 hotel was built in 1885. This is likely inaccurate as the article goes on
 to say that the building ".....was first used as a store and dwelling by
 the Mendenhall family. On the first floor was the general store. Living
 quarters for the family were upstairs.", but.....
- In 1884, 'W.H. Mendenhall and Sons' was recorded in Branson's Business Directory as having merchant businesses in both Charleston and Forney's Creek township.
- Therefore, they were likely doing business in this building pre-1884

Life in Swain County

- Montalvria Mendenhall married Emma Lou Justice in Wake County in 1879 and brought her back to Charleston. He died in 1883, leaving her a widow with 2 young children: son James Hudson (1880-1962) and daughter Hattie (1881-1966).
- In 1884, Mrs. Emma Mendenhall and her mother-in-law, Mrs. M.H. Mendenhall were appointed to a committee to facilitate the arrangement of tables for a celebration the completion of the WNC Railroad to the mouth of the Nantahala River. Brother William Carey Mendenhall was a marshall for the same event.
- William Carey Mendenhall married his brother's widow in 1887; had children Roxy Louise (1888-1976) and William Carey Jr. (1896-1974)

- M.H. Mendenhall died in 1887.
- After his death, the Hotel remained in the family until 1889, when it was put up for sale by W.C. Mendenhall

The headstone of M.H. Mendenhall is a thing of beauty, located a little west of the top of the driveway.



While it was up for sale, the hotel was leased to Benjamin Harrison Cathey (uncle of Mark Cathey)



William Carey Mendenhall – a 'Jack of All Trades'

- He was a wagoner
- He was a tobacco farmer who sold at the Asheville Market
- He was a cattle dealer
- He was a timberman who operated in Oconalufty (for Champion) and Forney's Creek Township
- He could also be a rabble-rouser

Monday night a few of the older "boys" proceeded to make merry. They became noisy and Officer Ditmore interfered. Somewhat of a row resulted and on Tuesday a legal investigation followsd. Before Esquire Everett Nathan Dellart, W. C. Mendenhall and N. B. Thompson were examined on the charge of resisting an officer. They were held for trial giving bail in the sum of \$200 each. Before Mayor Collins, Nathan DeHart, R. P. King, N. B. Thompson, Dan Shuler and W. C. Mendenhall were tried for being drunk and disorderly. Mendenhall was found not guilty. The others were fined \$3 and cests each.

William Carey Mendenhall – a 'Jack of All Trades'

- He overcame his legal troubles of 1889
- He had a special interest in law enforcement
- Listed as a deputy sheriff in 1896
- Served a writ of habeus corpus in a Graham County murder case
- He was also a revenuer raids documented in 1896 and 1899

Deputy Marshal W. C. Mendenhall came up from Bryson City last Thursday, and Thursday night he and Sheriff Roane made a raid on a blind tiger about three miles from town in the Sugarfork section. They ran on a negro named Harvey Penland and a white man named Hopkins dealing with moonshine. Roane caught the negro' by the overcoat, but he shed his coat and ran in the darkness and shot back at Roame. Hopkins fired two shots at Mendemhall fired four shots after him, two from a shetgun and two from a revolver. Both men escaped. There was about 125 gallons of whiskey, but only about fifteen gallons could be carried away by the officers. It is said that a crowd of negroes gathered in and disposed of the remainder.-Franklin Press.

Death of Emma Mendenhall, 1898

-Bryson City Democrat: Mrs. L. E. Mendenhall, wife of W. O. Mendenhall, died at her home in Bryson City last Sunday morning at 6 o'clock after an illness of several weeks. Mrs. Mendenhall was in her 42d year of age. She was a daughter of the late Hon. James M. Justice of Rutherford county and had a large circle of relatives in several counties. She was noted for her goodness of heart and charitable deeds to the sick and the poor, and her death is greatly deplored. A husband and four children survive her.


Death of William Carey Mendenhall

C. MENDENHALL IS TAKEN BY DEATH IN SWAIN COUNTY

BRYSON CITY, Nov. 20. (Special) Cary Mendenhall, 78, died at his home on Bryson Branch vesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock following an illness of three weeks. Death was a result of a complication of diseases. Mr. Mendenhall was a native of this section, being of a pioneer family. Prominent in his younger days in civic affairs, he served in several official capacities. He was a well-known lumberman and was employed by the Canton division of the Champion Paper and Fibre company. He was at one time a caretaker of Reuben B. Robertson's lodge at Indian gap.

Mr. Mendenhall was twice married. He is survived by his widow, the former Miss Orphie Milsaps, of Bryson City, and a son and two daughters by a former marriage.

Tentative plans are for the funeral services to be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Franklin Grove Baptist church with the Rew Thad Watson officiating.
